Our current exhibition *Fantastical Worlds* pairs 50 incredible works from the Powerhouse, Sydney, with over 40 of David Roche's most enchanting pieces in a glorious celebration of art and design.

FANTASTICAL WORLDS

For just three more weeks, The David Roche Foundation proudly hosts *Fantastical Worlds*, a travelling exhibition developed by Powerhouse museum, Sydney, comprising playful arrangements of old and new.

The Powerhouse collection holds many objects that instil a sense of wonder. *Fantastical Worlds* is developed around works from four artists and designers: Timothy Horn, Alexander McQueen, Kate Rohde and Timorous Beasties. Inspired by elaborate European art styles from the past such as Baroque, Rococo and Empire, they imaginatively transform historical ideas, forms and patterns into striking 21st century creations. Playful arrangements of new and old complement these artworks, revealing creative brilliance behind contemporary and historical designs. For this iteration of the exhibition, Powerhouse ceramics, jewellery, silver, textiles and fashion are joined by decorative arts objects and paintings from The David Roche Foundation in a wondrous offering of dazzling form, ornament and colour.



NATIONAL PHOTOGRAPHIC PORTRAIT PRIZE 2022

The David Roche Foundation is delighted to be the first venue for the *National Photographic Portrait Prize 2022* from the National Portrait Gallery, Canberra. Selected from a national field of entries, the exhibition reflects the distinctive vision of Australia's aspiring and professional portrait photographers and the unique nature of their subjects.

Now in its fifteenth year, the prize is one of the National Portrait Gallery's most popular annual events.

Among the 50 portraits on display are NPPP 2022 Winner Wayne Quilliam's powerful portrait *Silent Strength* 2021, depicting Aurukun man Eric Yunkaporta, People's Choice Award Winner Luther Cora's *Flora and Fauna, Giara: White Cockatoo* 2021, and includes the photography of Chris Budgeon, Tom Evangelidis, Adam Ferguson, Petrina Hicks, Bec Lorrimer, Jacob Nash, and The Huxleys.

CANINE TIDBITS

Among the pennants, sashes, medals and trophies displayed in the dressing room at Fermoy House is a small figure of a pug wearing a cap. Mr. Roche purchased the sculpture at a Bonhams & Butterfield dog-themed auction in New York in 2006.

The pug was made in Austria in the mid-nineteenth century. It is made from pottery and its realistic eyes are made of glass. It sits with a bright red Phrygian cap atop its head - a garment that was traditionally worn across cultures in Eastern Europe, the Near and Middle East in ancient times, and adopted as a symbol of liberty and freedom since the eighteenth century. It is less likely that this sculpture has a political undertone; during the mid and late-nineteenth century there was a proliferation of novelty sculptures of dogs wearing various hats.

Mr. Roche's love of animals extended into his art collection. A larger terracotta sculpture of a pug sits in the Den at Fermoy House, and a dog-themed work of art can be seen in every room of Fermoy House.

FROM THE ARCHIVES

The Red Hallway at Fermoy House is home to an impressive selection of animal paintings, including a group of intriguing pictures made from sand. This technique, known as marmotinto, was developed by Benjamin Zobel, a Bavarian painter and pastry-chef, who worked as a master pastry-chef at the court of George III around the time he developed the technique.

When David Roche's collection was catalogued in 1998, he held two sand paintings, one depicting two goats which had been purchased in London, and one depicting four sheep. When visiting London for the Summer Olympia Fine Art & Antiques Fair during June 2005, Roche purchased a sand painting depicting two Percheron horses in full tack, in a period frame by Samuel Pearse. A fourth painting depicting sheep was purchased at a Sotheby's London auction in March 2008. This work is impressive in size and inscribed B. ZOBEL in the lower right corner.

David Roche purchased a sand painting depicting rabbits and another depicting a lion from the 2011 sale of the contents of Dysart House, Kempton, Tasmania. Dysart's owner, Leo Schofield AM had acquired the pictures from the collection of Sydney antique dealer George Auchinachie, and hung them in the master bedroom at Dysart.

TODAY'S TREASURE

Showcasing the favourite pieces of our volunteers in The David Roche Collection. In this edition, Geoff S discusses a figure of St Roch seen by many visitors passing through TDRF's foyer.

In the foyer at TDRF is a statue of St Roch (in English "Rock") purchased by David Roche in 2012. The devotional statuette is made of painted and parcel-gilt fruitwood, possibly walnut, and dates from 17th century Spain. St Roch has a wound on his right thigh, symbolic of the plague, wears a pilgrim's hat with the symbolic crossed keys and shells, has a staff and is accompanied by a child and a dog.

Roch was born in Montpellier, France, and at birth a red cross was imprinted deeply into his breast, perhaps an indicator of what was to come in his life. When he was about 20 his parents died; he gave away his substantial inheritance to the poor.

He joined the mendicant Franciscan Order and embarked on a pilgrimage visiting towns in Italy caring for those ill from the plague, and curing some simply by making the sign of the Cross over them. By the time he arrived in northern Italy, he had contracted the plague. To avoid being a burden on others, he confined himself to a hut in a forest to await his death. A local nobleman's dog found him, brought

food to him daily and licked his wounds. Recovering his health, divine inspiration directed him to return to Montpellier where he was put into prison, accused of being a spy. He died there, abandoned after 5 years.

At his death a tablet appeared on the wall of his cell containing his name and a message that those who invoked his name in intercession would be cured of the plague. During the Council of Constance in 1414 the plague appeared in Rome. Following prayers, processions and intercessions to Roch, the plague ceased. He was canonised in 1427.

Saint Roch is the patron saint of dogs, dog owners, surgeons, invalids, bachelors, falsely accused people, tile-makers, second-hand dealers, apothecaries, pilgrims, grave diggers, and diseased cattle. His name can be invoked against sicknesses including cholera, plague, skin rashes and diseases, knee problems, contagious diseases, pestilence, and epidemics. Such a list perhaps appealed to David Roche, including the similarity in surname.


