From the Museum Director

Dear friends and supporters,

The National Photographic Portrait Prize 2022 has come to a close at TDRF after a very successful season. Last Thursday, visitors to our Twilight Evening were treated to two vibrant performances by Melbourne performance and visual artists The Huxleys, and a last chance to see the exhibition before it travels to Queensland. We are now transforming our gallery spaces for an exhibition of Arthur Boyd's spectacular tapestry series 'The Life of Saint Francis'. Executed between 1970 and 1974, twelve of the twenty tapestries illustrating the life of the saint will be displayed, the largest ever showing of these remarkable, contemplative works. I'd like to thank the National Gallery of Australia for loaning these treasures, including sketches, pastels, and lithographs that inform the development of the tapestries.

This month we welcome art historian Sylvia Sagona to present two lectures on French and Venetian art. On Wednesday 19 April Sylvia will speak to the life and career of pre-eminent French neoclassical artist Jacques-Louis David, and on Thursday 20 April she will explore the mythology around Venice, and how this was

manipulated to appeal to tourism in the eighteenth century and beyond. These lectures have been selling strongly and only limited tickets remain, so be sure to book now to avoid disappointment!

We wish you a happy and safe Easter, and look forward to welcoming you back to tours of Fermoy House this month. We look forward to welcoming you to Arthur Boyd's remarkable work from Friday 28 April.



The Sylvia Sagona Lecture Series

Wednesday 19 + Thursday 20 April 2023

In April 2023, The David Roche Foundation is delighted to present two talks by Sylvia Sagona. An expert in French and Italian art history, Sylvia will speak on the life and career of leading French artist Jacques-Louis David, and the re-imagination of Venice as a destination in the eighteenth century.

Lecture 1 - The fine art of survival: Jacques-Louis David: From Impresario of the Revolution and Napoléon's Empire to banishment from France Wednesday 19 April 2023, 6:00pm-7:15pm

There was much more to the career of David than being the artist who ushered in the new Neo Classic style which championed severity as being in harmony with the ideals of the Enlightenment. As an ardent Republican he would act as Robespierre's minister for propaganda and orchestrated the mass ceremonial rituals of the Republic which would be copied by Hitler. He transferred his allegiance and theatrical talent to the service of Napoléon whom he portrayed as he rose from General to Emperor. At the fall of Napoléon the greatest painter of the era was banished and even refused burial in France.

Lecture 2 - Myths of the Serenissima: The rise and fall of aristocratic Venice Thursday 20 April 2023, 6:00pm-7:15pm

By choosing the day of the Annunciation as its founding date, Venice would forever associate itself with angels, the Virgin Mary and divine right, which has woven a spell that endures today. Painters of its Renaissance Golden Age such as Veronese, Tintoretto, Carpaccio and Bellini encoded images of Venice as Venus and Victory, Mistress of the Adriatic. Although the Republic was in drastic decline by the 18th century, it reinvented itself as a destination for the English Grand Tourists who adorned the walls of their palaces with Canaletto's mass produced Veduta

paintings. The myth has been so powerful it now threatens Venice with extinction.

Modernist Adelaide: An Architectural Revolution!



Adelaide was fertile ground for architectural experimentation in the 1940s, 50s, 60s and 70s, when a new breed of forward-thinking architects redefined the city's skyline and streetscapes by embracing the aesthetic, technological and social aspirations of modernist architecture. Join award-winning historian Stuart Symons, Founder of Modernist Adelaide, for this engaging talk through time to discover the mid-century jet-age of *Mad Men*-era Adelaide.

Stuart Symons is a mid-century architecture enthusiast and founder of Modernist Adelaide, which celebrates Adelaide's 1940s–70s architecture through tours, events, online and his book, *Modernist Adelaide: 100 Buildings 1940s–1970s.* Stuart was awarded the City of Adelaide Prize Commendation 2021 and South Australian Emerging Historian of the Year 2019.

CANINE TIDBITS



David Roche's death in 2013 concluded a lifetime of love and work with dogs, in particular Afghan Hounds and Kerry Blue Terriers. One decade on from his death, it is timely to remember David Roche's passionate contribution to the show dog community over so many years.

This photograph is of David Roche with Ch Fermoy Liffey, a Kerry Blue Terrier who won multiple Best in Show awards, including the 1987 Royal Adelaide Show. Liffey acquired his name from the River Liffey in Ireland. Here, David Roche and Liffey are competing in the United States, under Phyllis Wolfish (left).

This picture hangs in the Dressing Room at Fermoy House.

Among the splendid furniture in Fermoy House you will find an elegant Regency Period Cellarette with a solid Mahogany carcass and brass inlay. It sits discreetly opposite the front door and is easily overlooked. It is an item which evokes the days of Dining Room etiquette and dress codes.

The cellarette retains the original red Morocco lining to the lid and original Barrons locking mechanism. A lockable drawer could be used for decanting utensils. Feet in the shape of paws and decorative elements of lion masks with rings echo embellishments on larger furniture in the collection.

Wooden boxes to hold bottles appeared in the fifteenth century. Then, wine bottles were squat, and the shape and size of Cellarettes has changed through time, often reflecting the prevailing decorative elements of the day. The term "cellarette" first appeared in George Hepplewhite's posthumously published work *The Cabinet-Maker and Upholsterer's Guide*. In 1803, furniture designer Thomas Sheraton wrote, "Cellarette, amongst cabinet makers, denotes a convenience for wine". Cellarette designs sometimes disguised the cabinet's purpose as a store for liquor, especially during American Prohibition.

Made of fine timbers such as Mahogany, Rosewood and Walnut, the cellarette would keep a few bottles of wine at a stable temperature before the dinner. No doubt the gentleman of the household would instruct his butler which wines to bring from the cellar for the evening meal.

I find these cellarettes charming in all the various sizes and shapes and speak of an elegance in dining that some may remember.

Mr. and Mrs. Bird were designed by Kay Finch and produced by Freeman-McFarlin Potteries through the 1960s. Finch was born in El Paso, Texas in 1903 but rose to fame for the ceramics she designed and produced in Corona del Mar, California from the late 1930s onwards. *Mr. and Mrs. Bird* are in fact a reprise of an earlier design of love birds that Finch produced, this second iteration conveys just as much character as the originals.

David Roche knew Kay Finch personally through her other love: dogs. She led Crown Crest Kennels, and her most successful ceramics depict a variety of dog breeds, especially Afghan Hounds, for which she was famed as a breeder. David Roche imported several dogs from Crown Crest Kennels, including Miss Carousel and Miss Capriole. Miss Capriole was mother to a number of Australian Champions, including Fermoy Holy Joe.

Over the years David Roche was gifted and collected a number of works by Kay Finch, ranging from mass-produced commercial pieces such as these, to unique works hand made by the artist, and modestly proportioned yet nonetheless handsome bronzes of Greyhounds and Afghans, several of which were modelled after her own dogs.





In his later years David Roche acquired a small but noteworthy collection of items made at the workshop of legendary Russian jeweller Fabergé. Among the works is a two-tone gold vesta case once owned by Count Mikhail Nikolayevich Muravyov, who was born in April 1845. One of the world's most impressive collections of Fabergé is held by the Royal Collection Trust.
